**IN PURSUIT OF SILK**

Textile expert, Dr. Mary Dusenbury, research curator at the Spencer Museum of Art at the University of Kansas, describes her trip to Central Asia to explore the resurgence of silk production and other hand crafts that has occurred after the collapse and withdrawal of the Soviet Union in 1991.

Dusenbury traveled from ancient oasis cities that once were important caravan stops along the Silk Road, to remote villages in the mountains along the Afghan/Uzbekistan border, and to the Fergana Valley, historically famous for horses and silk, and the heart of contemporary silk weaving today. The lecture and slide presentation takes place on Saturday, June 6 at 4pm, in the Wardell Room of

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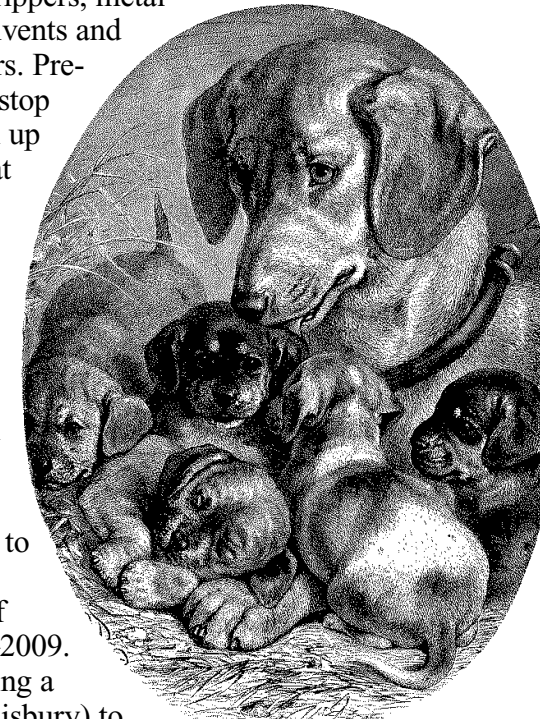

**HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE DISPOSAL**

The Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day will be at the Public Works Garage in Falls Village on Saturday, June 6, 2009, from 9am to Noon. Corrosive products (acids or alkalines), flammable, reactive, or toxic (poisonous) are used in our homes, cars, or lawns/gardens. Some examples are chlorine bleaches, oven and drain cleaners, pool chemicals, paint strippers, metal cleaners, gasoline, anti-freeze, solvents and degreasers, pesticides, weed killers. Pre-registration is required, so please stop by Town Hall in Salisbury to sign up by the deadline of June 5, 2009, at 12:30pm.



**LICENSE DOGS IN JUNE**

## TRANSFER STATION USER FEE

Attention all Salisbury residents & business owners: 2009–2010 Transfer Station Permits need to be purchased by July 1. Application forms will be processed at Town Hall and the sticker will be attached to your vehicle at the Transfer Station. The first sticker per residence is \$70; additional stickers for the same residence are \$40. Remember, this user fee applies even if you use a hauler. The towns pay \$69/ton to dispose of garbage in Hartford, and that does *not* include the trucking! Increased recycling and backyard composting are excellent ways to reduce our disposal cost.

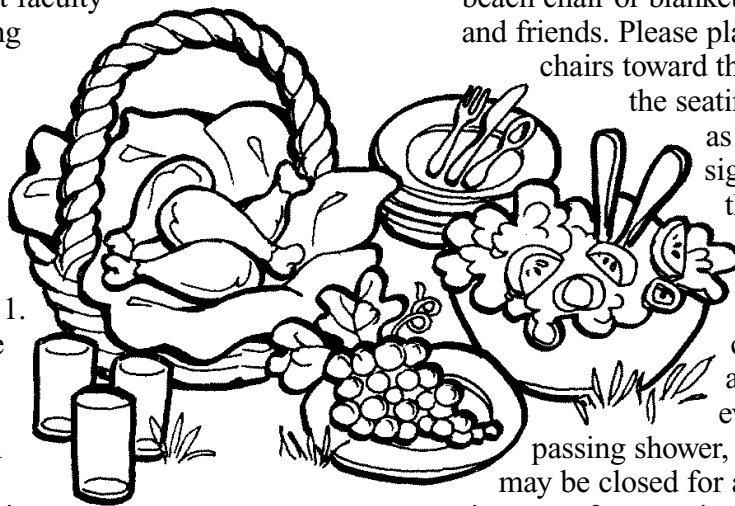
