COTTON AND RACE IN THE MAKING OF AMERICA

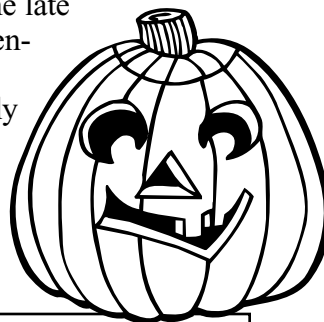

Stop by Town Hall in Salisbury to sign up for Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day at the Water Pollution Control Facility in Torrington, CT on October 10, 2009 from 9am–2pm. Corrosive products (acids or alkalines), flammable, reactive, or toxic (poisonous) are used in homes, cars, or lawns/gardens. Some examples are chlorine bleaches, drain cleaner, pool chemicals, paint strippers, metal cleaners, gasoline, antifreeze, solvents and degreasers. Pre-registration is required.

2009 HERITAGE WALKS

The Upper Housatonic Valley National Heritage Area (Housatonic Heritage) has announced this year’s calendar of heritage walks for October 3–4, 2009. More than 40 free, guided walks are offered in the heritage area, encompassing 964 square miles, that includes portions of Litchfield County, CT and Berkshire County, MA.

The 2009 Heritage Walks feature short walks as well as longer hikes, walking tours of towns and historical buildings, nature and bird walks, tours of industrial site ruins, a canoe/kayak trip on the river, and Native American walks. Historians, naturalists, and environmentalists will help participants explore the region’s rich historical, cultural, industrial, and environmental history. Many historically and culturally significant venues will open their doors to the public. Natural resource conservation organizations will provide access to, and interpretive talks about, many of the region’s significant resource areas.

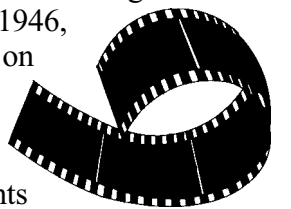
SPECIAL “SNEAK PEEK”
